

WORDS OF WISDOM

#1:

There is no doubt in my mind that I was called to Chaplaincy. No, perhaps it's more accurate to say that between our good and persuasive God and my spiritual director, I was both pushed and pulled into Chaplaincy. For the first six months of my ministry, I stopped in to see my spiritual director every night on my way home to recount the day's events, the students I'd met, the situations I couldn't conceive of and to report that I had managed to evade the "Career Police" yet again, avoiding the charge of impersonating a chaplain! In addition to being a wife and mother of four, I was surprised to find another sense of meaning - a third raison d'etre - in the role of shepherd to 2,200 students and over 100 staff.

By the time I entered the second stage of my ministry, I had moved to a different school, worked with dozens of principals and thousands more students, and settled into as much of a "confidence in my abilities" that any one of us can. Considering the boundaries, players and parameters of

our ministries change without notice on a daily basis, and let's be honest, sometimes from moment to moment, I felt good about my work and service; I was living out my vocation to the best of my ability assured that God is, was and always will be "in my corner"!

The final trimester of my ministry evolved out of a "perfect storm" of trauma and tragedy in both my school life and personal. The confluence of so much stress, prompted me to seek a brief "hiatus" from active ministry, followed by

a move to ministry in Elementary School Chaplaincy. I was rewarded by so many opportunities to be a part of 23 very different school communities, many more principals, and thousands more students, ranging in age from 5 to 14. It was a gift!

When I entered Chaplaincy 25 years ago, my imposter syndrome forced me to lean heavily on my belief that all would unfold as God intended. Thankfully, as it always does, my faith carried me through two plus decades of opportunities for growth and eventually helped me to let go of the very work I was challenged to take on all those years ago. Transitioning into retirement was a much tougher nut to crack than I had anticipated, but I have grown to love every minute of the flexibility and time I have to help in the schools of my daughter, and my grands! I thank God every day for the gift that was my service, in His service!


BEREAVEMENT
