

CSCO President's letter sent to all members October 2nd

Good afternoon CSCO Members,

As we are aware, the Canadian Union of Public Employees (CUPE), which represents school secretaries, school/system clerical staff, custodians, maintenance staff, EAs, Early Childhood Educators, Library Technicians, Child and Youth Workers and in some boards, Chaplaincy Leaders, have been working-to-rule in schools across Ontario for three days now and today they have announced their intention for a full strike beginning Monday.

Obviously, this affects everyone in our school system and for some of our CSCO members who are CUPE members, they are affected directly. These situations can be very difficult. It affects morale, causes frustration and stress.

As Chaplaincy Leaders, we are called to support our staff, students and their families. During these negotiations, I ask that you continue to do the good work that you do by being a presence, a listening ear, the hands and feet of Jesus. When things are challenging, we are called to do this in a unique and intentional way.

Summer Memories...

It is difficult to believe that we are already into October, as I watch the leaves change colour and begin to fall. Memories of summer seem distant at this time, but the kindness and hospitality of the people of Newfoundland will stay with me for years to come.

My husband, Alan and I celebrated our 30th Wedding Anniversary this past summer and our gift to ourselves was a two-week trip to NL.

No matter where we went along the East Coast, we were warmly welcomed.

Perhaps though, the memory that will stay with me the longest will be what I learned on the "Beyond the Words Tour", in Gander NFLD.

We had heard about this 3-hour tour from friends who had been there. If you happened to have seen the musical **Come From Away** sometime in the past year, you may understand the impact this tour had on us.

Al and I, along with 7 other people, were driven around the town of Gander to the schools, community centres and churches that had hosted the "plane people" during 9/11.

38 planes landed at the Gander Airport that day and the town of Gander, with a population of only about 10,000 people, opened its doors to approximately 7,000 visitors. Along with our tour of the places the "plane people" stayed, we were blest to hear a first-hand account of what unfolded by Dawn Baker, whose family had hosted a young 17-year old girl, flying on her own. Dawn's husband was an air traffic controller during the crisis and she herself is now a well celebrated children's author. She is a marvellous storyteller and as she shared her memories of that week 18 years ago, she brought to life, an almost unbelievable story of generosity and kindness at its very best. She spoke about simple acts of hospitality, blankets and pillows, home-made food and the offer of a ride, or a shower, or a loan of a vehicle. I do not have time within the scope of this article to describe all that we heard but I can tell you that there were particular phrases that have stayed with me, some from the documentaries, some from Dawn and some from the play, which we were lucky enough to see when it came to Ottawa in August.

Here are a few "take aways" for me:

"The road to Jericho ran through Gander that day."

From the musical, **Come From Away**: "Come on in, the door's open....

"We are what was lost, we also commemorate what was found..."

"We all looked the same, but we're different than we were ..." (after the 5 days in Gander)

From one of the documentaries, Tom Brokaw's Story, "Operation Yellow Ribbon"

created because so many of the younger generation were not around during 9/11 or were too young to remember – he felt the story needed to be re-told.

"If Gander could be shared with the world, the world would be a better place..."

He spoke about the "enormous contrast between the darkness of the events in the U.S. and the goodness of that was going on in Gander – an example of what humanity can be at its best."

When the people of NL were praised for what they did, their response was "This is how we live our lives, (they didn't know what the fuss was about), we help each other during troubled times."

The whole documentary was a reminder of how people in community, even across borders, can help each other - it brought out the best in human kind.

Our board's spiritual theme in Ottawa this year is the second line in Micah's framework for justice, "Love kindness and mercy."

I created our opening staff prayer service this year, using the thoughts and reflections I had journalled while on the tour. I invited each staff member to take a piece of birch bark and asked them to write their blessings, dreams and wishes for their students this year and we hung them on a line in our Tranquillity Garden. I gave each staff member a tiny spool of thread as a symbol to remind them that we are the threads of kindness that run through the lives of our families, our classrooms, our school community and our neighbourhood, connecting us all to the Source of all that is good, kind, loving and merciful.

Finally, on September 11th, as a follow-up to this moment of prayer and reflection with our staff, our PA. morning prayer focussed on peace and on Pay it Forward 9/11,— a movement that began in 2002 in the States, with Kevin Tuerff, one of the "plane people", as way to help people focus on the light of that day and the goodness that came out of Gander. If people were recipients of random acts of kindness, the world would be a better place. The prayer was followed up by a slide show on kindness that I sent to the homeroom teachers. That day, we also did a small fundraiser that would allow us to purchase sports equipment for our 6 feeder schools, as a way to Pay It Forward—a thank you to the educational communities that had shaped and formed our students and sent them on the path to our high school.

I am thankful, so thankful for the people in my life who have shown me kindness, who have opened their doors and their hearts to me time and time again, who have taught me the true meaning of hospitality by the living out of it in their own lives.

Thanksgiving blessings to each one of you, as we all reach out to our staff, especially our CUPE support staff, navigate through these stressful times.







2. how's the start-up been at school?




3. what are you thankful for?

I am enjoying retirement so far, much as I miss my amazing co-workers and beloved Chaplain friends. My life has fallen into a new routine with the same intention that has lead my life in Chaplaincy and every chapter before that: lovingly nurturing life.

My summer was spent mainly looking after my 90 year old mother as she was experiencing some serious health concerns. She is doing really well now, thanks be to God and the great care she is still getting from my sisters and the social and therapeutic supports we have put in place for her.

Now, mornings are my own, for prayer and reading, nurturing and harvesting my garden, and exercise. My afternoons are about supporting and caring for my eldest daughter's family: my beautiful energetic grandson, Albert who was 1 year old on Saturday, and my granddaughter Roisin, who is 10, my daughter, Erin (who teaches at a school in one of the most impoverished communities in Oshawa, by choice), and her husband Rick, who works an afternoon/evening shift at Sobey's warehouse. The continuity besides my family is my parish community, and my role there as Cantor and Children's and Youth Choir Director continues. It gets pretty humbling when you realize that many of the children you are working with are grandchildren of the families you knew working in parish programmes when your kids were little.

CSCO EXECUTIVE MEETING






DON AND MAUREEN HALL'S SUMMER TRIP TO FRANCE AND SPAIN

Some highlights were Mass with the monks, touching a statue of the black Madonna and a rugged 10 kms mountainous hike.











Antoni Gaudi was inspired by the beauty of the cone shaped mountains at the Benedictine Montserrat Monastery.
