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





#### LAUDATO SI' REFLECTION

#### **Practicing Resurrection for the**

#### **Love of Creation**

On April 20th and 21 st, CSCO hosted Luke Stocking of Development and Peace to speak on "Practicing Resurrection for the Love of Creation". Beginning with the beautiful Easter Greeting of "Christ is Risen!", we were asked to consider, given all that was going on in the world, does it feel like Christ is risen or does it feel like we are

"being put back in the tomb"? How can we be signs of the Resurrection in a dark time? How can we 'practice resurrection'? What an intriguing phrase- 'Practice resurrection'. It is the very last line in a poem written by Wendell Berry (Manifesto: The Mad Farmer Liberation Front, first publication in1973). The poem is an interesting read.

Luke shared that for himself, two things were important in this practice of resurrection: Firstly, learning to listen; to cultivate a sense of peace and secondly, being 'obstinate in hope'. In small group we were then asked to reflect on the following questions: How do I receive these words — "Christ is Risen!" and how have I felt the call to be a witness to the Resurrection and to practice resurrection in this Easter Season?

I am thankful for the open, honest, and rich conversations. 1 Peter 3:15 tell us "Always be ready to make your defense to anyone who demands from you an accounting for the hope that is in you; yet do it with gentleness and reverence."

Our challenge after the first day's talk was to find an image of "Resurrection in Creation". Photos and stories of the 'new green' sprouting from withering browns, tulips in the snow, blooming trees amidst the concrete, crows and red foxes, garlic peeking through the snow, resilience of social movements; were shared as signs of great hope and joy amidst this time of pandemic.

On the second day Luke introduced us to the "For the Love of Creation" initiative (www.fortheloveofcreation.ca) and the "Letter of the Faithful" project. We were now invited to go deeper in our reflection on our spiritual experience with creation. Paraphrasing Luke, "In order to live during this time of pandemic, we need to have a long view-to think about the future of humanity on this planet-and in particular, we need to face the ecological crisis that we have." In small groups and using the "Letter of the Faithful" guideline we shared our responses to questions such as "How is the Creator's wisdom revealed in Creation? What can other creatures teach us? In the context of climate change, what do you fear, and where do you see possibility or hope?"

With the upcoming COP26 summit in Glasgow being held in November 2021 we urgently need to be carbon free in the next decade. Lives and livelihoods depend on this. Commitments to have a low-carbon economy are imperative. Do we know the significance of below 1.5 degrees Celsius by 2030?

"For the Love of Creation wants to hear how our faith speaks to the climate crisis our world is facing. Caring for the Earth and protecting it is both a moral and a spiritual imperative. Everyone in Canada and across the world must respond to that imperative in their own way." (From their website)

This two-day journey sowed many seeds in fertile soil. I left with a greater resolve to learn more about the work of FTLC and a deeper sense of my interconnectedness to creation. Laudato Si'!

I encourage all of us as Chaplaincy Leaders to get to know and use the For the Love of Creation website both for professional development and in ministry. It is a concrete way to practice resurrection and build hope.

#### REFLECTION ON LOVE

The original reflection continues to touch people.

#### Love is For ... Giving

Nothing is sweeter than love; nothing stronger, nothing higher, nothing more generous, nothing more pleasant, nothing fuller or better in heaven or earth: for love proceeds from God, and cannot rest but in God, above all things created. ~ St. Therese of Lisieux

In sharing these insights and quotes, it is my sincere hope they will be helpful to others. How do you know if someone is a blessing or a lesson in your life? Although it is possible for people to be both a blessing and a lesson, they are usually one or the other. Are you being loved or are you being deceived? Pause and prayerfully ask God for signs to help you discern. In the end, people never abandon people they love. People abandon people they are using. Too often, we love things and use people. We do not live in a black and white world and relationships are often complicated and messy. We are an imperfect people in an imperfect world. St. Mother Teresa reminds us that "If we really want to love, we must learn how to forgive."

Are you holding onto your friends too lightly or are you holding onto them too tightly? It is a delicate balance. Is there mutual compatibility? What happens when one person holds on lightly while the other person holds on tightly? There is no common ground. If you hold on too lightly, there is not enough to hold the relationship together. On the other hand, when you hold on too tightly, there is undue tension and stress. Often these friendships are shortlived.

Be thankful and happy for the gift of friends and never take them for granted. Friendships are special gifts that need to be gently cared for, tended to and cultivated like a garden. It takes mutual commitment, genuine love, prayer, sacrifice, communication, respect, trust, authenticity, honesty, discipline, patience, creativity, humour, maturity, timing, chemistry and the grace of God for a life-giving relationship to take root, grow and bear fruit. "

*To love is nothing, to be loved by someone is something but to be loved by the one you love is everything.*" ~ Bill Russell

Genuine love is a decision of both the mind and the heart. It is not based on convenience, a passing feeling, a mood swing, the time of day or the season of the year. There is a world of difference between someone who is committed to the relationship only on certain days versus someone who is faithfully committed to the relationship every day. Are you viewed by the other as a priority or merely an option?

Mark Twain wisely reminds us: "Never allow someone to be your priority while allowing yourself to be their option."

Are you being valued as a higher priority in the relationship with the passage of time? In contrast, when you are still seen as only an option in a long-term relationship, it is time to end the relationship and move on with your life. You deserve so much more. In relationships, we need to recognize that not everyone is ready to make a lifetime commitment. It is liberating when you appreciate that people are free to accept or reject the love that is being offered. There is no need to judge or to be upset with someone who chooses the latter as some are incapable to make such a commitment. As difficult and painful as this reality is to accept, choice is one of the profound mysteries of love.

It is impossible to love someone if you do not love yourself. This is foundational and will determine what you accept and how you allow someone to treat you. Words are important, but too often they are cheap, dishonest and meaningless while actions are usually invaluable. Mixed signals and red flags are present for a reason and should never be ignored. When you are blindly in love, this is often difficult and almost impossible to perceive.

Balance is so vital in everything. For example, when a wheel is out of balance or if your workday is out of balance, you will soon know it and the results will take their toll. There are times when relationships are out of balance for a variety of reasons. Do both people have a voice in the decision making? Timing is also a factor that should never be underestimated. People have different needs, values, and priorities and these do not always remain the same over time. Are these predominately in sync or are they usually in conflict in the relationship? In the end, the writing is on the wall if the relationship is in a perpetual state of imbalance. Would your relationship exist if you treated your significant other the way they treat you? The answer to this question tells you everything you need to know, or possibly already feel in your heart.

There is much to be said about the importance of moderation. At no time can love ever be rushed or forced. A relationship that heats up too fast usually ends just as quickly. Never beg to remain in a relationship. No matter who you are, what you said or what you did would not have made a difference in a one-sided relationship.

If a person has pure intentions, and the other person cannot commit, both lose each other. In contrast to the confusion that is common in a lop-sided relationship, when you are genuinely loved, you will know it. Authentic love is both a human and divine gift. The proof is always in the pudding. St. Therese of Lisieux summed it up beautifully: "Love proves itself by deeds. Miss no single opportunity of making some small sacrifice, hereby a smiling look, there by a kindly word; always doing the smallest things right, and doing all for love."

It takes two mature, honest, and committed people who know what they want, and joyfully and unconditionally love each other for the relationship to grow and stand the test of time. St. Paul reminds us that "there is nothing love cannot face; there is no limit to its faith, its hope, and its endurance." When you are mutually blessed with a loving friendship and relationship, do not ever let the sun set on your spats and disagreements. In the profound words of St. Francis of Assisi: "Love lightens all difficulties and sweetens all bitterness."

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Know and believe that you are always enough. When this is not mutually acknowledged and affirmed, the relationship is over. Although this is much easier said than done, do not give in to the temptation to ponder the million and one unanswered questions why the relationship ended because nothing will ever have made a difference.

You will waste your precious time and only add to the disappointment. You will always be more than enough for someone who is right for you and never enough for someone who isn't. If you have done everything possible for the relationship to grow and it falls apart, be at peace and trust that God is calling you elsewhere. Providentially, some relationships are blocked for reasons that we may never fully understand on this side of eternity. It is okay to not have all the answers and to not have complete closure. Let go ... let God and move on as you cannot live in the past. WON-DERFUL blessings that you could never imagine await you in the future. When God answers our prayers, we are being directed. When our prayers are not answered, we are being protected. Trust that "there are more tears shed over answered prayers than over unanswered prayers. When we accept what happens to us and make the best of it, we are praising God." ~ St. Teresa of Avila

What is the one thing that people wish they could do if they had one more chance at life? Would we love more deeply God, others and ourselves in thought, word and deed? St. Augustine of Hippo succinctly describes what is the essence of love. "What does love look like? It has the hands to help others. It has the feet to hasten to the poor and needy. It has eyes to see misery and want. It has the ears to hear the sighs and sorrows of men. That is what love looks like."





## LIVING WITH CHRIST REFLECTION

#### 12th Sunday in Ordinary Time

The readings today are a reminder of who we are and whose we are. God answers Job after Job's struggle to understand why tragedy has come into his life. Paul's letter reminds us that God is still active, recreating us and the world around us. Mark's Gospel shows us disciples who are frightened by the weather: their boat that appears sturdy and capable when the waters are calm now appears so tiny and vulnerable. Once the disciples waken him, Jesus calms the storm and asks why they are afraid. In all these readings, we have very strong images that speak to us of trust and peace. We find ourselves often getting swept up in the storms of life and this can be overwhelming. We can relate to Job and the disciples - we struggle with trusting God and we easily get anxious. We wonder where God is as we face challeng-

"Peace! Be still." Jesus is inviting us to trust him fully. Though we may be feeling uncertain or scared, God is letting us know God's faithfulness is stronger than what we are feeling in any given moment. We are to trust God's perspective rather than our own. We always want to know why things are happening. Instead, let us ask God how these circumstances can help us grow in holiness.

# NATIONAL INDIGENOUS DAY REFLECTION AND PRAYER

Today is National Indigenous Peoples Day, a day for all Canadians to recognize and celebrate the unique heritage, diverse cultures and outstanding contributions of First Nations, Inuit and Métis peoples. As we celebrate today, we also acknowledge the harm done to Indigenous Peoples by churches and governments. We hold in our hearts the grief and pain of the confirmation of hundreds of children in unmarked graves at former residential schools across the country. We know from survivor testimonies given during the Truth and Reconciliation Commission and from the final

TRC report, that many thousands more never came home, and their resting places have yet to be confirmed. We know as well through testimony to the TRC that survivors experienced unspeakable trauma, suffering and loss at residential school, which they then caried back to their families and communities. We know that too many of those communities still struggle with the trauma of systemic racism and carry the burden of those policies in

lack of clean safe drinking water, adequate housing and access to education and medical care. May each of us make time today to learn about the culture and lived experiences of Indigenous peoples in our own community and throughout Turtle Island. May each of us recognize the work we still must do towards reconciliation and right-relationship with the Indigenous peoples with whom we share this land we call Canada. May we commit as a community and as individuals to the work of listening, of acknowledgement and of nurturing relationships of dignity and respect.

#### Creator God,

we pray that your Spirit move in our hearts and our communities, breathing new life into the broken relationships between Indigenous and non-indigenous peoples in Canada.

May your Spirit work
in us to be witnesses and allies in this journey towards truth, reconciliation
and justice.

In our own daily lives, as well as in our systems of government, may our actions always honour the dignity of each person and nurture right relationships with Indigenous people.

We ask this in your name. Amen.

She says I'm not afraid to do things, try things or do things on my own.


That part is true. I'm super independent. Not always a good trait.

What is the most important thing for you on your goal/bucket list?


